In hosting the Crossley Shield final in August 18 months of planning came to fruition in a brilliant event leaving the League Executive delighted at being able to sit back and enjoy the game without having to worry about anything. Although this was a great example of the club pulling together Chris Dalby as 'organiser in chief' must be congratulated for being the driving force behind it.

As usual *Silly Point*' contains full reviews of our senior sides so I'll simply comment that top 5 finishes for both Saturday sides was very credible. Never flirting with relegation the 1st eleven would benefit from more consistency with the bat if they are to challenge for honours. Two or three new recruits could make all the difference although it was great to see our first woman make her premier league debut in August, congratulations Olivia.

From potential title contenders early season the 2nds fell away somewhat after their Crossley Shield semi-final defeat to Booth, a blessing given we hosted the final, rallying towards the season's end. Reliant too often on two or three players they are still a 'good scalp' for the opposition.

The Sunday team struggled in Division 2 but never lacked enthusiasm and relegation is not a disaster. They could benefit from two or three more experienced players turning out each week making games both more competitive and probably enjoyable for the juniors.

I am pleased to report that the Chair of Selectors advises that player availability has been much improved with 9 First X1 players making at least 20 appearances.

In taking this opportunity to thank all those people responsible for the smooth running of SBCI special mention is given to those preparing a first class wicket and ground in general plus the 'Monday gang' for keeping the pavilion in great shape. Laura has been brilliant in organising Saturday socials and Dave Brown steps down as junior coordinator having done this for the last 10 years or so.

We have a number of club roles to fill – many of the committee have served the club for a long time and succession planning is needed. We must be proactive so keep an eye on social media for job descriptions and opportunities and please don't just shrug your shoulders waiting for someone else to step forward.

A number of league umpires are standing down this year many giving their reason to finish as poor player discipline. It is understandable to be frustrated and disappointed if decisions do not go your way but whinging about them does us no favours. Please be aware and take on board for 2025.

And just like that the 2024 season has been and gone and yet again it feels like a case of what might have been, which seems to be a common theme in my end of season summary. A fifth placed finish for me is a fair reflection of where we are as a team, we've finished one place higher than we did last year, we've won over 50% of our completed league games (again an improvement on last year) and 170 points is the best return in my 7 years as captain.

Traditionally we've always struggled to recruit and I've always said, in the current climate if you manage to hold onto all your players from one season to the next then you're doing well. Unfortunately for us, we lost Sam due to a change in job meaning he could no longer commit to playing and the arrival of Baby Sykes meant Dan also was unable to commit in 2024, both key 1st XI cricketers. Thankfully, despite interest from other clubs Brad decided to stay and give first XI cricket a go with us and Divakar was finally eligible having fallen foul of the league rules around overseas cricketers in 2023. Additionally the LBG production line

continued to be a profitable one for us and we were able to add Yuvraj and Lakshmi to the 1st XI squad.

So into the season and we lost the first game to the weather meaning we officially started away at Shelf Northowram. I won the toss (I know...Schoey was shocked too!) and had no hesitation in bowling first on what was a very green track. That decision was vindicated with us managing to bowl Hedge Top out for just 48 and despite a mini wobble and the loss of 4 wickets in the chase, the result was never really in doubt. Up next was last seasons unbeaten treble winners Thornton and the result of the season for me. I won the toss again! and asked them to bat first and was delighted when we managed to bowl them out for 173 despite knowing it would be a tricky chase. We managed to put some decent partnerships together and despite being 97-4 at one stage, big contributions from Tom 63, myself 49* and Gnanam 38 saw us record a fantastic win with 5 overs remaining, inflicting Thornton's first defeat in 16 months.

Unfortunately we were unable to follow up the week after with another win when really we should have done, chasing 170 for victory at Bradshaw, we were 91-2, then 121-4 before falling agonisingly 6 runs short of their total. Momentum is a massive thing in any sport and that was definitely a momentum shifter for us especially after the high of the week before. Despite beating Augustinians the next day in the first round of the cup, we went on to lose our next 4 leagues games, firstly to Oxenhope when we were dismissed for only 101 and then to Luddenden Foot when we were all out for 89, albeit the loss of the toss that day didn't help as we were asked to bat first on a very damp track. Those 2 defeats were followed by defeat to Triangle on the first weekend of June, although it was by the narrowest of margins in a really good game of cricket, we fell only 5 runs short chasing 220 at home, thanks to contributions from the middle order (Dollars 64, myself 37, Gnanam 55 and CK 30).

If Thornton was the high point of the season then Queensbury away was definitely the low point for me as we crashed out of the Parish Cup in embarrassing fashion and a lesson to always pick your strongest team and never take any opposition for granted. Credit to Queensbury they raised their game, bowled and fielded exceptionally well and were deserved winners in the end. See what I mean about momentum, that's now 4 losses on the spin since the game against Bradshaw and it was soon to be 5 with defeat at Booth the week after.

I won the toss again! and sensing that our better performances and victories this season have come when batting 2nd I asked Booth to bat first. At 55-5 with Scoffer taking 4 of those, I thought we'd be comfortably chasing less than 150 to win however a 100+ middle order partnership between Matthew Hoyle and Rick Laycock saw us chasing 231 for victory. With confidence a little low it was important we got off to a good start and Tom and Adam made sure of that as we raced along to 39 before we lost our first wicket, unfortunately we quickly lost several more wickets and found ourselves in a big hole at 56-5! Myself and Gnanam managed to rebuild and were going great guns as we put on 80 for the 6th wicket before Gnanam was adjudged LBW and the momentum of the whole game shifted, myself and CK added a further 43 but a further 3 quick wickets and we were all out for 186.

We finally managed to get back to winning ways with a 4 wicket win away at Illingworth, set 182 to win we managed to reach our target with only 4 balls to spare in an exciting and

morale boosting fashion, Tom with 48 set the platform upfront and CK did the rest at the end scoring 37 off 17 balls including 3 big sixes! We managed to close out June with another win, this time against Copley. The scoreline would suggest it was comfortable however batting first we found ourselves 59-5 and in a spot of bother, but thanks to Alex's 59 and runs again for CK we got to a competitive score of 167. Excellent bowling from Lewis 4/37, well supported by Alex 2/33 and Tom 2/10 saw us dismiss Copley for only 88.

Our good form continued in July with us managing a further 3 wins against Sowerby Bridge, Shelf Northowram and Bradshaw respectively, all 3 wins were us chasing for victory something we've been notoriously bad at in the past with the famous SBCI CC batting collapses. Our only defeat was a loss to Thornton however it was another case of what might have been. Bowling first we had them 56-5, 74-7 and 99-8 but in the end they managed 150 and I guess that's one of the reason why they've done as well as they have over the last few years, scoring 76 runs for the last 3 wickets ultimately won them the game as we only managed a disappointing 84 in reply despite Jamie scoring 48.

Into August and a historic moment for the club as we handed a first XI debut to Olivia Thomas at Oxenhope, our first female to play senior cricket and the first to play 1st XI premier division cricket in the Halifax league. Two fine catches and a maiden wicket marked a sign of things to come for Liv. Unfortunately we were unable to pull off another chasing victory after being set 236 to win, despite the best efforts of Gnanam (who hit his maiden century for the club) and myself putting on 164 for the 6th wicket we fell an agonising 7 runs short! The rest of August saw us take revenge against Luddenden Foot for defeat earlier in the season, a fairly heavy defeat at Triangle in a "run fest" and then defeat in a poorly executed run chase against Booth after we'd done really well to bowl them out for 129, and got ourselves into the position of being 97/3 before losing the last 7 wickets for 19 runs! We did manage to end the month on a high with a comprehensive victory over Warley & Elland beating them by 75 runs.

After the first game of September fell foul to the weather half way through the first innings we finished the season with 2 fantastic wins, first at Copley where despite being in a little bit of bother again, this time 30-5 chasing 145, a 97-run partnership between Yuvi (getting his maiden 1st XI 50) and myself 51* we got home by 4 wickets with just over 4 overs to spare. The last game of the season saw us put local rivals Sowerby Bridge to the sword in clinical fashion and in the process consigned them to 1st division cricket in 2025.

Thank you to Adam for his support as vice-captain both on and off the field, for those that don't know this was Adam's last year at SBCI as he moves to play closer to home. On behalf of everyone at the club I just wanted to say a massive thank you, you've been a fantastic team-mate, vice captain and servant to the club and you will be a big loss to us.

Once again thank you to the ground staff, the work you put in make it a truly wonderful place to play cricket (when the weather plays ball) Thank you to Olivia our scorer and everyone who did teas, its one of the hardest things to organise and I appreciate everyone that volunteers to take a turn and even more so those who do more than one (mum!).

Finally a big thank you to everyone of the players that's a pulled a shirt on for the first XI this season, everyone of you has given your all and that's all I can ask for.

Finally, congratulations to all the prize winners, I hope everyone enjoys the annual dinner, has a great winter and see you again in 2025.

Following a season containing our first silverware, the second team entered 2024 full of hope. We looked younger, fitter and more ambitious than ever, obviously author's licence to stretch the truth is being played here! But two sporting cliches put paid to any silverware, "it's a game (season) of two halves" and "catches win matches" played out all too true in 2024. It was a bit of a rollercoaster but the team stuck together took the rough with the smooth, supported all the new social events and managed to consume copious amounts of alcohol. The end of season awards proved the wheel never lies.

We finished the season in 5th place with 12 wins from 22 games, 1 abandoned and 9 losses. We lost games against all 4 teams that finished above us but the bigger disappointment was

probably losing to the two sides that were eventually relegated. The cup again proved a route for success just losing out to Booth in the semi final at home, the team that won the league. Although we didn't make the final, hosting Triangle vs. Booth was a massive success for the club and an event we can be very proud of for a long time to come.

We started the season brightly with a 9 wicket win at home against GHPC, Keasty starting strong taking 6 of the 7 wickets we got and Greeny starting the season how he didn't mean to go on with an impressive 53 no. Next brought Bridgeholme, with the skipper missing his first of 5 games in the season, a close game went to the wire, as the opposition got over the line with 2 balls to spare.

May was more successful as a month with us winning all four games including an 8 wicket win at Bradshaw, a super over win in the first round of the cup at Queensbury, with Dylan and Mark outstanding in the league's first and only super over so far! A nervy 2 wicket win at Mount, with only 14 boundaries in the game telling the story of the outfield, Chris scoring a controlled 50 to get us over the line. A comfortable win at home to Greetland followed, although once again bowling first we failed to bowl out the opposition, this became a bit of a theme unfortunatley! Tony hitting ex pupils all around the ground for an unbeaten 70.

June was a mixed bag with 6 games including 2 cup fixtures. A trip to Triangle up first and one best forgotten as we finished third in a two horse race. Highlights certainly didn't include the skipper going for 33 in 3 overs, not actually sure how he got more than one to be honest. Mike showed how it could be done with a respectable 3 for 23 off 8 overs. Tyson offered some resistance with the bat hitting a better than a run a ball 50. The cup on the Sunday gave us the opportunity to get back on track against one of the favourites and last season's league winners Illingworth. 95 and 61 not out for Chris and Tyson respectively saw us canter over the line and into an away quarter final against Warley, last year's final opponents.

Next up Sowerby Bridge and another 12 points, with Keasty and Veitchy taking the bowling plaudits and Tyson continuing his fine form with the bat. June rain put paid to us against Booth, followed by a comfortable 85 run win against Warley in the league, Mark top scoring with 66 and Tony close behind with another 50. Rob leading the way with the ball with an impressive 4 for 10 from 8 overs. Illingworth away saw us falter with the bat, having bowled them out for 158 we only mustered 101 in our chase. The final game of June was the cup quarter final, and it turned into a bit of a walk in the park, quite literally as Greeny could be seen walking around the outfield whilst the umpires sorted some controversy in the middle. We bowled Warley out for 62, including 3 for 6 for Rob and then knocked them off 1 down with Dollars, in his last 2nd team game of the season, scoring an unbeaten 40 ably supported by Greeny with 12 no off 56 balls!

July brought 3 league wins on the bounce against Blackley, GHPC and Bridgholme. This took us to third in the league and into a home semi-final against Booth. We won the toss and elected to field eventually bowling Booth out for 194. A few dropped catches along the way meant they probably scored 40 more than they should have. Mark starred with the bat with 57 but we fell short by 42 in our defence of the shield. This was probably the turning point in our league season as we then registered 4 losses on the bounce against Bradshaw, Mount, Greetland and Triangle and kissed goodbye to any chance of the league. Lack of application with the bat, the skipper's inability to win a toss and dropped catches probably being the key

components of a bad run. Sowerby Bridge saw us turn our form round, followed by another loss to Booth, victories against Warley and Illingworth leaving us with a final day trip to Blackley. Nearly everyone got a bowl with only Mark "refusing" to turn his arm over, the highlights being Jack getting his first senior wicket, Dylan running out one of their batters with a direct hit form the boundary edge and getting 59 no and the father and son Fellows opening the batting together for the first time, the sign of things to come perhaps.

As always, I'd like to thank loads of people and apologies if I miss anyone. Lucy, Verity and Adrian our scorers especially with the new technology off Frogbox to cope with, Jonathan as always our reliable umpire, who managed to help get the league umpire back on side when any overstepped the mark. John as well who stood in when Jonathan was away or the league asked us to provide an away umpire too. To everyone who makes the ground and clubhouse look so good every week, it really is a pleasure to play at home and we got loads of compliments this year from visiting team. Everyone who did teas, it remains one of the hardest things to organise, so thanks Pam for making sure the teacakes and fillings are there every week and to Jo who baked more weeks than not. The social side has been something special this year many thanks to Laura for the injection of events into the calendar.

To the boys who turn up week in week out, we try and enjoy the game, win, lose or draw and its certainly soon forgotten off the field. Each and everyone has stood up and delivered at some point this season and for that I thank you. Tony for his contribution with the weekly and seasonal "awards" and once again to Matty, my vice-captain, I said it last year and I'll say it again he makes the game more enjoyable both on and off the field, he keeps me sane, and I'll be forever grateful of that.

So, as I sign off as both author of this piece and my third stint as second team captain, over a nearly 40 year period, I hope you winter well, and look forward to seeing you at some point next year!



Hoping that the above names will go onto have long and successful careers in cricket and inspire the next lot of SBCI juniors to give senior cricket a go.

Libby Fellows continues to be the flag bearer for women and girls cricket not only at our club, but also continuing to be selected for the Yorkshire Under 13's girls side.

Overall, a great season, all things considered. A big thank you to everyone who has helped out with coaching on a Friday night (or running the bar), to umpiring and scoring on a match night. Under 15's

Success can be measured in so many different ways, but here's how I do it:.

I think it was about this time last year that we had a conversation about the fact that many of the 2023 U13 squad would be moving up to an age group that SBCI didn't have. This would have meant 6 or 7 kids who'd played together for the previous 3 or 4 years throughout U11s and U13s, having to split up and either play their cricket elsewhere, or worse case, not play at all.

So, it was decided we should try and do something about it, but numbers were light.
